I come from a long background of civic activity. My first memorable volunteering experiences came from Eltham College in the UK. We had half a day each week for Community Service and we could choose the type of volunteer activity we found engaging. Back in my native Estonia, I started my first NGO in high school in mid-1990s, when most people in Estonia did not know, what an NGO was. Later, I served as CEO or on Supervisory Board for a number of different civic organisations. I was involved in creating Estonia's first venture philanthropy, where I managed the first portfolio of social enterprises that the fund invested in. For 7 years, I was also first a Member, later the Chairman of Supervisory Board at Estonian Network of Nonprofit

Organisations, the national umbrella organisation for NGOs. Combining my civic activity background with my legal education, my love for debate and my passion for technology, I've been a vocal proponent of designing and using technology in ways that support civic initiatives, democracy, freedom of speech and open societies. I participated in the first Let's Do It cleanup in 2008 and later became involved in the management of LDI. It was there, that a group of people came up with the idea for a civic discussion platform. Initially called "the pipeline", it later became Citizen OS and we have now been building the grass-roots decisionmaking platform for more than 5 years. It's been great to see how Citizen OS has been used to collectively decide environmental issues in Indonesia and I'm very excited to be a part of the Digital Innovation Program.
